The song is a 17th-century hymn for Holy Week that was at one time only performed by the choir of the choir of the Sistine Chapel. The hymn, which translates to "Have mercy on me, O God" and is a setting of Psalm 51, was written for two simultaneous choirs, which is why four of VOCES8's singers step to the side mid-performance to sing short sections of the piece.
