

The Gold Lacquer of Hope: What Mends Heartbreak

Last year, we explored the depths of mission leadership, from our sponsored and cosponsored ministries. How have you grown over the year since the pandemic? As Pope Francis <u>mentioned</u>, we either come out of the pandemic better or worse. We journey this Lent with heartbreak, but we look towards the light of hope, as expressed by the psalmist:

"The Lord rebuilds Jerusalem, and gathers the dispersed people of Israel, healing the brokenhearted, and binding up their wounds."

(Psalm 147: 2-3)

The light of hope can mend and strengthen our brokenness, much like the Japanese restorative art, kintsugi (see picture below). Kintsugi involves restoring ceramics that have cracked with gold lacquer. The ceramic piece is fully restored, with its cracks still visible. Kintsugi does not hide the blemishes that were initially there. The restoration brings forth a certain newness – the once fractured piece now a beautiful piece of art.

Reflecting on our heartbreak, we look at how hope restores brokenness. Hope is the golden lacquer that mends our heartbreak, which does not hide the



brokenness of our experiences, rather gives meaning to them. David Whyte in his book *Consolations: The Solace, Nourishment, and Underlying Meaning of Everyday Words* writes this about heartbreak, that it "may be the very essence of being human, of being on the journey from here to there, and of course to care deeply for what we hope to find along the way." All of us have experienced heartbreak during this pandemic. What broke your heart?

As you go through this newsletter, look at the heartbreak that the leaders, faculty and students from our ministries experienced and how hope moved them to a new horizon. Ministry Services holds with the Atlantic-Midwest Province the heartbreak of the recent passing of Sister Grace D'Amico. former Coordinator of Board Development. We thank those who kindly submitted a story to be featured in this March issue of United in Mission. We wish you a blessed journey from Lent to Easter!

In a beautiful <u>prayer</u>, attributed to Jesuit Father Pedro Arrupe, we read, "Nothing is more practical than finding God, than falling in love in a quite absolute, final way. ... It will decide... what breaks your heart, and what amazes you with joy and gratitude. Fall in love, stay in love, and it will decide everything." The past twelve months have certainly provided us with events to break our hearts. We felt the tremendous shock of the unjust killing of George Floyd, as local communities across the nation took to the streets, giving voice through peaceful protests. We watched in horror as a mob of lawless, violent rioters stormed and destroyed our nation's capitol and threatened our whole democratic system. We have watched helplessly as family, friends, and colleagues have suffered



with and perhaps even died of COVID-19.

At Notre Dame of Maryland University, we have watched with bated breath as government regulations were designed to remove all protections from DACA children. These things all broke our hearts. We, women and men of faith, know that "action on behalf of justice and participation in the transformation of the world fully appear to us as a constitutive dimension of the preaching of the gospel..." (1971 Roman Synod of Bishops, Justitia in Mundo, no. 6). Taking part in peaceful protests, sharing our pain and faith in discussion groups, writing to political figures were all elements of healing our souls.

Heartbreak becomes hope when we remember to join ourselves with our sisters and brothers in the healing process. Our newly elected president has called us to unity and called us to love one another. What a breath of fresh air! We remember Pedro Arrupe's words, "Fall in love, stay in love, and it will decide everything."

Annual Leadership Meeting 2021

The first virtual Annual Leadership Meeting was held on Friday, February 26th. The opening prayer, led by Ministry Services, featured a Visio Divina of the "The Boat Church" by Julia Stankova. Sister Charmaine Krohe, Provincial Leader, introduced the topic by highlighting key sections from last year's keynote by General Superior, Sister Roxanne Shares, SSND, which this year's theme flowed from. Diane Artis, EdD of Olive Branch Educators, delivered the keynote, "Mission Leadership in Challenging Times, Take Two: Strategies of Self-Care." Diane engaged participants on sources of burnout during the pandemic and invited them to reflect on where they find themselves on the journey of self-care.
